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to our town

Our ambitious plans to become a world class visitor destination are now one step closer, following the news of an exciting partnership with one of the North East's leading leisure providers.

The Danieli Group own and operate the container villages. STACK Newcastle and STACK Seaburn in Sunderland, which have welcomed millions of visitors who come to enjoy great food and drink, live music and entertainment in unique surroundings.

And that winning formula is on its way to Bishop Auckland, after the company was appointed a development partner by Durham County Council, which will see the creation of a mixed-use leisure venue at Newgate Street, in the heart of the town centre.

Although the scheme will be housed in a purpose-built building rather than shipping containers, the design will include elements of STACK's signature look.

STACK Bishop Auckland will bring together independent street food traders, special events and music at the vibrant new development, which should have the knock-on effect of boosting the local economy as a whole.

As well as creating around 120 full and part time jobs, STACK Bishop Auckland will also offer opportunities for local food traders to set up shop as well as giving the town's evening economy a much-needed boost.





Welcoming STACK

Work is due to get underway in 2023, with the scheme set to be ready to open in 2024.

Neill Winch, CEO of the Danieli Group believes it will be a huge asset for the town.

"Our intention for **Bishop Auckland is** the same as at **STACK in Newcastle** and Seaburn - to offer something for everyone," he said.

"We know we can create a welcoming hub of activity and a place which everyone can enjoy - even visitors of the four-legged variety as we're pet friendly.

"Our mix of exciting street food and drinks and a programme of varied entertainment makes STACK attractive to everyone.

"However, we are much more than just

a food and beverage outlet. We contribute to local culture, jobs, enterprise, tourism, and communities.

"In particular, we support new business start ups, local producers and local music talent. We are in the business of transforming places and hope to be a catalyst for transformation in Bishop Auckland."

Reinventing the town centre

Businesses on Newgate Street are already seeing the rewards of the Property Reuse Fund - a vital part of our Bishop Auckland Masterplan and our plans to regenerate and bring life to the town centre.

133 Newgate Street **Inspiral Cycles**

Gary and Fiona Ewing, owners of Inspiral Cycles on Newgate Street, applied to the scheme with hopes of contributing to the accommodation offer for the up-and-coming tourism scene.

They used the money from the grant to redevelop the upstairs of their new bicycle workshop into an ecofriendly, self-contained flat, with the aim of renting it out as a holiday let for those visiting the bike trails such as Hamsterley Forest or the new tourist attractions in the town.

Work has started to entirely refit the space using energy efficient materials. It will also see solar panels installed to help make the accommodation as ecofriendly as possible.

Fiona said: "We wanted to be able to contribute something different to the highstreet. The location of where we are with such close access to the countryside, means there is so much for visitors to discover. We have to rethink the future of the town and what it has to offer with tourism, recreation and leisure.

"Without the grant it may have taken us at least five years to save up enough money to be able to carry out the work. With all the investment going into the town we really need landlords and businesses to come together and make the best of it."

Fiona and Gary have also used the Business Improvement Grants to improve their shopfront with repainting and new signage, helping their business to stand out on the highstreet.

By reducing vacancy rates and bringing buildings back into use with a more diverse and modern retail, hospitality and accommodation offer, the Property Reuse Fund will help bring significant economic benefits to the town by attracting visitors who will want to stay longer, leading to higher levels of spend during visits.

Joanne and Wayne Parnaby opened the doors to their new venture earlier in the summer and it has already proven to be very popular amongst shoppers and diners.

The grant was used to redevelop the entire three floors of the building. The ground floor is now a home accessories store, and the upper two floors boast a luxurious coffee lounge bar that pays homage to the heritage of the building.

A total of almost 70 per cent of the cost to complete the work came from the Property Reuse Fund.

Wayne said: "Without the funding we could never have afforded to fulfil this ambition. We're putting our own little mark on the town and there are already lots of plans and developments for Newgate on the way. I hope other businesses take advantage of the help available so we can bring the town back to life. like what it used to be."

Improving transport links

Durham County Council is proposing to build a new, modern bus station using money from the **Future High Streets Fund**. Designed for a bustling town centre, it will be located on the existing bus station site between Clayton Street and Saddler Street.

It is also proposed to introduce a new surfacelevel car park next to the new bus station site which will include provision for more generously sized parking bays, EV charging, accessible parking, and wheelchair accessible parking.





The concept designs are currently being developed and it is hoped they will be available for the public to view both online and in person at locations around Bishop Auckland town centre early in the new year. The public consultation details are still to be confirmed and will be advertised in advance by Durham County Council. Your feedback on the designs would be gratefully received when the consultation opens.

Stronger Towns

We have also just been gathering your views on a number of other proposed projects to the town as part of the £50 million government funding from the **Stronger Towns Fund** and the **Future High Street Fund**.

Current projects under development include Market Place improvements to allow for future events and new cycle hub facilities. Further property reuse funding is also being prepared to reduce the number of empty properties on streets surrounding the Market Place.

Other projects would see funding used towards redeveloping 41 and 42 Market Place into a 60-bedroom boutique hotel to offer accommodation to the town's growing tourism economy, alongside the introduction of an artists' hub and the creation of more training and employment opportunities for young people in the town centre.

Meanwhile, improvements to the road network at Tindale Crescent will help to reduce traffic delays and allow the next phase of development to move forward more quickly.

Thank you for taking the time to contribute your views, whether by completing the online survey or by coming to see us at one of the drop-in sessions that were held in early November.

Following the consultation, Durham County Council will consider the responses and feedback to the Stronger Towns Board before detailed plans and drawings are prepared.
